Rev'd Mandy writes...

In London, near Trafalgar square, stands the Church of St Martin in the Fields. This Church has for many years worked with homeless and vulnerable people in central London and also individuals and families in need all over the UK, many threatened by homelessness or with experience of being homeless.

The Church bears the name of St Martin who as a saint is remembered on 11th November each year. It is Martin's story which inspires the work of this famous London Church.

St. Martin of Tours (A.D. 316-397) was born as the son of a senior military officer of the Roman army. Attracted by the Christian doctrines, he went to the church as a candidate for baptism (catechumen) at the age of ten, even against the wishes of his pagan parents. At the age of fifteen he had to join the military and became a soldier.

On a bitterly cold winter day, he was passing through the city gates of Amiens. He saw a scantily dressed poor beggar, shivering in

the snow storm. No one cared for him. Out of compassion, Martin cut his fine military cloak into two pieces with his sword. He gave one piece to the poor man who thankfully wrapped himself with it as a shawl. Martin covered himself with the other half.

That night, Martin had a dream. Jesus appeared before him, dressed in the half-cloak which he had gifted to the beggar. Jesus showed the mantle and said to the surrounding saints and angels "Martin, as yet only a catechumen, has covered me with this cloak."

Martin remembered the words of Jesus: "I tell you, whenever you did this for one of the least important of these brothers of mine, you did this for me" {Matthew 25: 40}. He was soon baptised. He renounced the army and announced that he would be a soldier of Christ. He spent the rest of his life as a zealous missionary, preaching the word of God and suffering humiliation and punishment to uphold his faith. He lived as a monk and formed the first monastery

in France. Later he was ordained as the Bishop of Tours. He led the fight against heresy. He is a patron saint of soldiers and of France.

Martin's story reminds us that 'no man is an island entire of itself' that we all are connected to each other as part of the human family here on earth and we have a duty to care for our fellow human beings wherever they are.

Even and especially in this season where we face financial struggle, may we never overlook those who go hungry and are without the basic necessities of life.

Since the easing of pandemic restrictions, I've been undertaking a 200 hour placement at St Andrew's Hospital as part of a qualification in pastoral care and healthcare chaplaincy. You will probably know that St Andrew's care for some of those with the most complex mental health difficulties. This is in addition to continuing work in the

parish, being involved in curate training in the Diocese, a volunteer chaplain to Northants Fire Service and a Locum Chaplain at NGH.

Chaplaincy is an area to which I have felt drawn and which I have had agreement from Bishop Donald to pursue. As my placement at St Andrew's comes to an end I have been

invited to continue as an Honorary Chaplaincy Assistant there for approximately two days a week and the Bishop has given permission for this.

Was it a child's faith or coincidence, but against all odds, BoyBoy made a full recovery

Shedversation. A Story—Part Two

Scams, or ways of defrauding people of their money, have come a long way from when a person with a van would knock on your door and offer to do some 'essential roof work' that they had spotted needed doing for £100. After providing this 'service' they would come to ask for more money, since the £100 was only a 'survey fee.' It was then that they would offer to drive the victim to a cashpoint to withdraw the necessary extra money. If this failed, pressure would be put upon the victim to pay up or their 'illegal roofing' might have to be reported to the authorities. Other methods of intimidation, and even violence have sometimes been used to extract cash. Whilst this method of getting money is, unfortunately still used, other, newer, ruses are in use on the internet.

My favourite one at the moment is where a person phones and says "There is a problem with your computer and we need to run some tests." If the victim permits access to their computer they can hijack the computer for nefarious purposes.

Last time I was talking about online dating scams but there are some other scams that go on too:

Report it

If you've been a victim of a scam, you can report it to the police through <u>Action Fraud</u>. They could catch the scammer and stop somebody else falling victim to them later down the line.

How to report a scam or fraud

Scams and fraud are on the rise, and if you're unlucky enough to be caught up in one, the best thing you can do to begin the recovery process is to report it. Here's what to do:

What to do straight away

Before you report a scam or fraud, and you think you might have been scammed yourself, there are two things you need to do:

- 1) Stop sending money straight away. If the payment has been set up as a Direct Debit, get in touch with your bank to stop this immediately.
- 2) Beware of follow-up scams. Sometimes after you've initially been scammed you might get targeted again by a fraudster who says they can get your money back.

Report dangerous scams and fraud to the police

For most scams, you would first go to <u>Action Fraud</u>. If a scam is putting you or someone else in danger and it's an emergency though, you need to call the police on **999**.

You should also call the police if:

- A fraud is in progress or occurred within the last 24 hours
- You know the suspect and they live in the UK

- The victim is vulnerable because of age, mental or physical impairment, or in need of care and support
- You think the police need to preserve evidence or prevent loss, such as CCTV, or recover large amounts of money transferred from bank accounts before it can be transferred away.

Report scam emails and online fraud

Trying to con people using emails or websites is becoming popular. If you've found a website trying to do this, or have been caught up in a scam, here's what to do:

- If you got an email, you can contact the service provider that sent you the email, such as Yahoo! or Outlook..

 Some will often have a 'Report phishing' or 'Report scam' button. The email address can then be closed down.
- If it's a website or you've been caught in a scam, report it to <u>Action Fraud</u>. They have an <u>online reporting</u> tool that is quick and easy to use.
- You can also report the fraud to companies that are advertising fraudulent services, such as when adverts appear on Google or Bing.
- Sometimes fraudsters impersonate organisations, such as pretending emails or phone calls are from HMRC. You can contact the companies that are being impersonated as well.

Financial service scams, including mortgages and insurance

Almost all financial services – services that deal with shares, credit, insurance, mortgages and soon on – should be authorised or regulated by the Financial Conduct Authority.

• If you are targeted by an organisation trying to give you these kind of services, you can report them to the Financial conduct Authority.

Pension scams

Pension scams are some of the most dangerous types of fraud because they're targeting large sums of money, money that is people's life savings.

- If you've already agreed or signed something you're now not sure about, get in touch with your pension provider straight away. They might be able to stop a transfer before it happens.
- You can also report investment scams you've been the target of to the FCA using their reporting form.
- If you have lost money to a suspected investment fraud, you should report it to Action Fraud on **0300 123 2040** or use the Action Fraud <u>online reporting tool</u>.
- If you have doubts about what to do, ask a pensions specialist such as MoneyHelper. Call them on **0800 011 3797** or visit the MoneyHelper site for free pensions advice and information.

Report investment scams

Much like pension scams, these can be very scary for people as the sums of money involved are often very large.

• Report a scam you think you've been the target of to the Financial Conduct Authority FCA's <u>reporting form.</u>

• If you've lost money to an investment fraud, you should report it to Action Fraud on **0300 123 2040** or online using the Action Fraud reporting tool.

Report scams that use Royal Mail

You might also have received fraudulent papers in the post. There are a few steps you can take. You can:

- Forward the letters to Royal Mail with a covering letter explaining what's happened to: Freepost Scam Mail, PO Box 797, Exeter EX1 9UN
- Send an email scam.mail@royalmail.com or call 0345 611 3413 explaining the fraud
- Contact The Mailing Preference Service (MPS) who will remove your name and address from mailing lists. You
 can call them on 0845 703 4599 or use the MPS website
- A favourite scam using Royal Mail's name at the moment is to send you a text advising that you have to pay an additional fee to receive your parcel. This involves handing your bank details over.

Report scam phone calls

If you suspect you're being targeted by a premium-rate telephone service scam:

• You can make a complaint and report it to the Phone-paid Services Authority (PSA), the UK regulator for phone bills, by calling them on **0300 303 0020**, or by visiting the <u>PSA website</u>.

Report online shopping scams and payment fraud

It can sometimes be difficult to work out if you've been the victim of a scam or not. But, if something goes wrong with an online purchase, here are the steps to take:

- If you've been sent a defective item, or the wrong product, get in touch with the online seller you got it from.
- If you don't hear back, or you're not happy with their response, you should contact your card provider, for example VISA or Mastercard.
- If you don't remember making a purchase and think it could be someone using your card for fraud, let your bank know straight away. They can then block the card so no more payments can go through. You'll normally get your money refunded back from your card company if your card details are used online without your permission for fraud.
- If you think you've been targeted by a scam you can also report it to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 or use Action Fraud's online reporting tool.

HEDGEHOGS.

We are fortunate enough to have in our community a little creature which has lived on our planet in its current form for 65.5 million years. However, now, solely because of human activity, it is on the Red List of Endangered Species. This little creature is the Hedgehog.


We do, however, have it in our power to help remedy this situation before it's too late, just by changing some of our behaviours in and around our homes and in the community generally. By checking carefully before we strim or mow long grass; before we strim any overgrowth at ground level, including shrubs, blackberry bushes (brambles); making sure there is no nesting hedgehog camouflaged by the undergrowth- they are very well hidden by grasses and blend so well in to that type of habitat that careful checking will undoubtedly save Hedgehog lives.

They also do not run when frightened suddenly- they have a tendency roll into a ball, and try to protect themselves that way. Clearly a small hedgehog, however tightly they roll up, is no match for metal blades or strimmer wires.

Slug Pellets are still being used, these are toxic not only to slugs, but to every small creature in the garden, including birds and mice. Hedgehogs eat mice, worms, slugs and various other garden creatures. They will eat dead creatures and if these creatures are poisoned, then the hedgehogs will also die a slow painful death from their meal. These pellets are also dangerous to pets.

Nematodes are now easily bought, and only see off the slugs, no other creature will be harmed by the use of a nematode.

November means bonfires, and woodpiles are a prime place for hedgehogs to nest. It is advised by the British Hedgehog Preservation Society, (BHPS), to move the woodpile piece by piece before lighting it then any hidden 'hog can make its escape and not be roasted alive. Similarly, check before burning garden waste, or lighting a fire pit, now quite popular it seems. The danger to Hedgehogs - and other small creatures, including birds- from household waste is



well documented. Hedgehogs trapped in plastic can holders used by shops to hold 4 cans together has been warned about for years, yet still people are not cutting these items to make them safe before disposing of them. Similarly with the elastic loops on the masks we are now so used to seeing discarded willy-nilly around the streets. Birds and hedgehogs with their heads and bodies stuck in these things are becoming ever more frequent. Just a bit of thought before disposing of these things would make a world of difference.


Across the country communities are creating 'Hedgehog Streets', making small holes at the bottom of fences in gardens, both public and private, so that the Hedgehogs can roam their areas in safety without having to go into busy roads- where so many die- to walk their nightly miles across their roaming areas which we have built on. Just a hole the size of a CD case,3 sides, roughly 7 cms will do perfectly. In Duston, it is noticeable that more and more fences are being installed with thick concrete bases. These are not helpful to Hedgehogs at all, obviously. Just a bit of thought before sealing every aspect of the boundary wouldn't go amiss.

As David Attenborough has said: "Sometimes we need to take a step back and just remember we have no greater right to be here than any other animal".

That thought in our heads would indeed do the natural world a huge service.

Remembrance

As we approach the Remembrance Day commemorations we remember the sacrifices made by those who died during conflict and war, but we also remember the sacrifices made by those who survived. Many lost loved ones, their homes and their way of life too.

Apart from what became known as "Thankful Villages," those all-too-rare places where every serviceman and woman returned home safe, each city, town, village and hamlet in the land lost men, boys, women and girls, few could match the sadness recorded on the war memorial in the village of Roade, Northamptonshire.

Among the list of names of lives lost, the war memorial bears silent testament to three brothers from one family; William, Jack and Tom Every, who were killed in

various theatres of war during World War Two. William was 23, and died in the Central Mediterranean Theatre of War, and is buried at Cassino Military Cemetery, Italy. Jack, holder of the Military Medal, was 22 and died in Tunisia and is buried in Sfax War Cemetery in Tunisia. Tom, aged 25, was killed whilst a Prisoner of War at Heydebreck, and is buried in Krakow, Poland. They left behind them their father, Thomas, their Mother, Winifred, and their youngest brother, Frank Every.

Letters sent home by the brothers, and other contemporary documents, were kept by the late Mr Frank Every, who at the time was too young to go to war. These papers were later deposited with the Roade Local History Society, and from them we can get a glimpse into their family life, their thoughts and feelings at the time, and ultimately the stories of the three brothers' demise.

Roade Local History Society has had the foresight, by way of tribute, to turn

these documents into a play which charts the brothers' lives, and those of their family during this period. The play was performed, to much acclaim, at Roade's Elizabeth Woodville School on Saturday 9th November 2019, and is set to be performed again, national situation permitting, at the Deco theatre in Northampton on Sunday 16 May 2021.

The Every Brothers were more than mere names on a cold memorial to be read out annually. They had lives, loves, hopes and dreams and they gave their today so that we could have our tomorrow. They will be remembered and we will remember them.

There is a gentle irony, and accidental symbolism in the title 'The Every Brothers – Their Story.' It could be said that they represent 'every' brother who has died in arms, as well as the sacrifices made by them and their families.
