Revd Mandy writes

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and lasts for 40 days (not including Sundays). It is the time when Christians prepare for Easter.

It is a solemn time which reminds us of the time in Jesus' life when, after giving up his work as a carpenter, he began to teach people about God. Jesus prepared for this by spending 40 days without food alone in the desert.

Lent is still a time for fasting or going without certain foods. Nowadays many people give up a favourite thing they enjoy and often give the money they would otherwise spend, to charity.

You may have heard people ask the question 'What are you giving up for Lent?' You see, in the Middle Ages everyone fasted during Lent. That meant going without all the nice things like meat and butter, eggs and cream and eating only plain food. But



before this time of Lent and fasting or doing without particular foods, there is Shrove Tuesday, a day of feasting and celebrating God's goodness.

Traditionally pancakes were eaten on Shrove Tuesday, pancakes made from the butter, cream and eggs that would be forbidden during the next six weeks of Lent.

In Lent when people give up things like chocolate or biscuits or alcohol, it is to remind them not to depend solely on material things for fulfilment, but to remember that we depend on God for all our needs. Also, denying ourselves certain luxuries helps us to think of others, perhaps those who are not able to enjoy the luxuries we do. And in addition, perhaps, to give money that has been saved during Lent to help others, especially those in particular need.

Today Christians also use the 40 days of Lent to think about their own relationship with God and to discover how God wants them to follow him more closely.

With that in mind....

we are asking people to consider donating to Christian Aid's Afghanistan appeal during Lent this year. People are starving in Afghanistan, with more than 8 million on the brink of famine.

Drought, the war in Afghanistan and the Covid-19 pandemic are causing a catastrophic rise in hunger. Children are dying today, and a million more under the age of five are at risk of dying over the next three months. Decades of conflict, poverty, and the disruption caused by the COVID-19 pandemic were already taking their toll on the people of Afghanistan.

The recent conflict and change of government, coupled with the worst drought in 27 years, have tipped the country over the edge into humanitarian crisis. Economic collapse has sent food prices soaring. Afghanistan's health care system has reached the brink of collapse.

Christian Aid's partners are on the ground scaling up their operations, and are able to reach the people most in need. With your support, they and their local partners can:

- provide emergency food and nutrition support for children
- support healthcare facilities
- provide winter kits to help displaced families stay warm
- supply clean drinking water
- protect women and girls

British Red Cross

I am writing to let you know that our Mobility Aids Service is still operating in Hatton Close, Moulton Park, Northampton NN3 6SU. This is a service that the British Red Cross provide to families to help them take a loved one out and about if they are frail or have mobility issues. We are also able to supply toileting aids such as commodes and raised toilet seats. The British Red Cross Mobility Aids Service is the biggest national provider of shortterm wheelchair loans: last year we provided 64,500 pieces of equipment to 54,500 people from our 185 outlets. We operate on a notfor-profit basis: all proceeds are used to deliver this ser-

vice across the UK, helping people, whoever and wherever they are.

There is a small charge for this service, depending upon circumstances: We offer help and support to those who may not be able to meet the cost. We would ask that where you have anyone contacting you that you feel would benefit from this support, you consider giving them our contact details. Please be assured that we will treat everyone who contacts us with respect and dignity.
